ANCOR staff were deeply saddened to hear of the passing of Senator John McCain this weekend. His career as a statesman was eclipsed only by his record as a war hero, and his valiant fight against brain cancer was simply another marker of his resilience. To say he will be missed is an understatement.

In 2017, ANCOR awarded Senator McCain with its [Congressional Leadership Award](#). Over the span of the three and a half decades he spent in Congress, Senator McCain sponsored or lent his support to countless bills aimed at ensuring the rights of people with disabilities to live fulfilling, dignified lives, integrated in their communities and embedded in the fabric of our society. Most notably, in 2017 he cast the critical deciding vote to protect the Affordable Care Act—and, with it, Medicaid—maintaining funding for the critical supports and services ANCOR members provide to more than a million individuals each year.
